

Sermon Discussion Guide for Groups

"Isaiah 11"

Preached by Daniel Grothe December 7, 2025

Summary

Have someone in your group read the following summary aloud. Pastor Daniel preached from Isaiah 11 about God's ability to bring new life from devastation. Using the metaphor of a shoot growing from a dead stump, he explained how God can restore what has been cut down in our lives. He emphasized that even when life feels reduced to nothing - whether through our own mistakes or others' failures - God specializes in bringing hope and new purpose from our places of greatest pain. He shared stories of a man named Rob, who created a YouTube channel helping millions after being abandoned by his father, and Tony, who went from prison to preaching the gospel. The message concluded with the promise that our areas of greatest pain can become sources of our greatest passion.

Opening Prayer

Open your session in prayer, using the words below or your own Heavenly Father, as we gather today to study Your Word, we ask that You open our hearts and minds to what You want to teach us. Help us to be receptive to Your Spirit's leading and to see how Your truth applies to our lives. We pray that You would speak to each person here according to their specific needs and circumstances. Give us ears to hear, eyes to see, and hearts that are willing to be transformed by Your love. In Jesus' name we pray, Amen.

Discussion Questions

Answer as many of the following questions as time and interest permit.

- 1. How does the metaphor of a shoot growing from a dead stump speak to situations in your own life where you've experienced loss or devastation?
- 2. What does it mean to you that 'in the kingdom of God, there are no justs' - that everyone is eternally important regardless of their occupation or status?
- 3. Rob's story showed how abandonment led to a ministry helping millions. How might God be preparing to use your past pain for future purpose?
- 4. What does it look like practically to 'buy God a little time' when you're in a season of waiting for restoration?
- 5. How can our places of greatest pain become sources of our greatest passion for ministry and helping others?
- 6. What 'shoots of hope' have you seen God bring up in your life or in the lives of people around you?

Making It Personal

This week, identify one area of your life that feels like a 'stump' - something that has been cut down or feels dead. Spend time in prayer asking God to show you how He might want to bring new life from this situation. Consider how your past pain or struggles might be preparation for helping others who face similar challenges.
